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From the PRINCIPAL

Since the election of the Labor Government in March, there have been some major changes in Education under Minister Car. The Secretary was replaced with a career educationist—Murat Dizdar. The election platform included promised changes to education to increase staffing levels, reduce teacher workload and drive better equity and diversity outcomes. A roll-out of permanent positions being offered to temporary teachers in eight areas of the state started in the North-West and is due to reach Metropolitan South before the end of the year.

On May 18, an unprecedented *Statement of Intent* was signed by the Minister, the Secretary, the President of the NSWTF, the General Secretary of the PSA, the AECG, the NSW Secondary Principals' Council, the NSW Primary Principals' Association, the NSW Special Education Principals' and Leaders Association (SEPLA), the Federation of Parents & Citizens Association of NSW and the School Administrative and Support Staff Professional Association. The collaboration was designed to address four outcomes: rebuild the teaching workforce and restore pride in the profession; put teachers and school staff at the heart of the NSW public education system; address workload challenges and improve the working experience for all school staff and teachers; and improve outcomes for learners at every level.

The Government pledged itself to consult meaningfully and to work in cooperation with its partners. Since then the NSW Government has produced a plan for NSW public education for public consultation with the ambitious title of *Transforming lives through public education*. Administrative staff have been added to 20% of schools to address work flows to find ways to ease workload. The Behaviour Policy Review was put on hold. The *Curriculum Reform Schedule* for stage 6 was pushed back to 2027 to soften the change agenda for teachers. The Government

took the decision to have mobile phones for students banned by Term 4, under conditions 'best suited to your circumstances'. Given that we are a six-day GPS school, we are working on a draft policy that meets the particular needs of our students. We are being exhorted to rise to the equity challenge and to strive to meet the needs of diverse students. The Government's attention has been firmly on attendance and on resetting attendance expectations so that more families push their children to come to school for more of the time.

The Government's ambitious agenda will be tested by teachers in terms of a better pay deal. Inflation and mortgage stress have added urgency to the issue of improving staff morale via fairer remuneration. We all want to be focused completely on improving outcomes for students, so the sooner the remuneration issue is settled, the better.

Meanwhile, the School continues to push forward with its *Strategic Improvement Plan* centred around improving student reading and writing. Multiple Staff Development Day sessions have been devoted to the task this year. The staff have also developed a shared understanding of *effective classroom practice*. The agreed lesson steps are: establishing tone in the teaching space; reviewing previously taught content or skills; outlining the learning intentions for the lesson and what the success criteria for learning look like; explicitly instructing the content; providing modelling in the form of exemplars or worked examples, gradually releasing teacher direction (I do, we do, you do) and concluding with summaries of questions asked. Our aim is for most staff to be following this blueprint for effective practice most of the time to improve the overall quality of our pedagogy. Ours is a work in progress.

Academic & Co-curricular Highlights

At the recent National Latin Examination, High linguists earned several gold medals and Lachlan Yuen achieved a perfect score 40/40.

Eric Scholten was runner up in the prestigious Lawrence Campbell Oratory Competition.

Dean Johnsun represented the SHS Cadet Unit in the 2023 Australian Army Cadets' National Adventure Training Award (ATA) and was awarded the prized 'Boomerang and Torch' badge.

Luka Miletic and his partner won Best Delegates (Bhutan) at the Model United Nations Competition. Luka and his team also won Best Delegate (Netherlands) in the first Australian Harvard Model United Nations.

In a field of 55 teams from 31 countries, our Calcaholics team received an Honourable Mention in the International round of the International Mathematics Modeling Challenge. (More on page 8.)

Our 8B Debating team of Arnav Kaushik, Ryan Park, Sajjan Thiagalingam and Alay Mahidadia won the final of the Friday Evening Debating Competition (see page 8). Abrar Chowdhury, Vishruth Anand and Agastya Govind were selected in the CHS Debating Representative team this year.

Eric Scholten and Joshua Li were invited by the Australian Maths Trust to participate in the invitation-only 2023 AMOC Senior Contest for highly accomplished student mathematicians.

Jiazi Chen and Thomas Chen were accepted to the 2023 NSW State Senior Wind Band.

Rachit Saini was shortlisted as a finalist in the Top 50 Trailblazer Awards, recognising Stage 6 students who have used their final years of schooling to make an impact in their local community.

In the Science Olympiad Stage 5 competition, Thomas Cao, John Fang and Ryan Allen achieved a High Distinction (top 10%), and William Zeng a Distinction.

Oscar Ho won a 'Highly Commended' at the St George Instrumental Eisteddfod for piano.

Our Chess Team regained the GPS Chess Championship Cup, a competition hosted and sponsored by High since 2006.

Da Vinci Decathlon 2023

This all-day interdisciplinary event was held again (in person for the first time since the pandemic) across two days in July, with High fielding teams from Years 7 through 10. Each team consisted of eight students who were chosen from the all-rounder lists and through staff recommendations in specialist areas such as Art, Design and Technology and Drama.

Approximately 1500 students from across the Metropolitan area, Canberra, the North Coast and west of the Blue Mountains came together at Knox Grammar for the academic challenge.

The Year 7 Da Vinci team of Vlad Loukine, Matthew Ryder, Jason Van, Charles Fawcett, Maxi Ibrahim, Otto McBride, William Tran and Alex Deng scored Top 10 in Art and Poetry, Code Breaking, and General Knowledge. Special thanks to Mr Writer (Social Science) for recommending Alex, who inspired the team to 5th place in Geography, and Tian Xing Yang for his mentoring in Maths and Code Breaking.

The Year 8 team included some students who participated last year: Alay Mahidadia, Charlie Cheshire, Jiekai Maio, Tuyvan Mai, Jack Francis, Sajjan Thiagalingam, Yuhai Wang and Terence Wang came 14th Overall and their best results were Geography, Maths, Ideation, Engineering and General Knowledge.

The Year 9 team of Jude Ou, Humzah Ahmed, Zuhayr Haq, Aaron Huang, Nathan Nguyen, Lachlan Yuen, Michael Zhao and Ayman Ahsan achieved Top 10 in English, Legacy, and Geography, and 4th in Maths.

Year 10 (a number of whom are pictured below) was represented by: Aayan Azhar, Ric Hou, Xavier Perry, Jeff Tse, Arthur Qiu, Andrew Pye, Micah Jouravlev and Shafayat Hossain (whose inspirational work on the Geography paper earned 4th place in a competitive field). They came an impressive 5th overall, with great results in Science, Engineering, Code Breaking, 4th place in Maths, and a phenomenal 1st place in General Knowledge.

Sporting Highlights

Eleven of our swimmers were selected in the Combined GPS Swimming Team.

Our fencers did well at the Roberta Nutt Individual Fencing competition, including Dean Johnsun who won gold in the senior foil—the first High victory in this event for more than twenty years. The team went on to have a stellar season, placing across numerous age groups and categories in the NSW Schools Fencing League, NSW Fencing Association and NSWFA AJ Rae competitions, and taking home the Roberta Nutt Shield and the AJ Rae Shield for Boys. They also shone at the national level in both individual and team events in the Australian Intermediate and Senior Schools Fencing Championships.

Oscar Greville was selected into the CHS Rugby team; Naeer Nibras and Harry Xin were selected to one of the GPS President's XV Rugby teams (U16).

Henry Lau made the NSW CIS U16 and NSW All Schools Basketball teams and attended the Australian camp for the FIBA U16 Men's Asia Cup.

Hikun Nguyen made the Combined GPS First XI and Aiden McManus and Dylan Dutt the combined GPS U16 Football team.

Max Russell finished his final season at High as GPS Cross Country Champion, and went on to perform well at the National Championships. (See page 14.)

High performed well at the 2023 AAGPS Athletics Championships. Among the highlights were Oscar Greville winning Open Shot Put, Max Russell winning the Open 3000m and Owen Trinh setting a new GPS record in the U13 100m.

Andy Zhang represented Australia as a member of the U16 Australian Volleyball Team and Axel Lam competed in the Australian Youth Indoor Volleyball Championship.

Our Senior Table Tennis Team won the CHS Knockout.

Challenging Maths

Sydney Boys High School had four teams participate in this year's International Mathematical Modelling Challenge (IM2C) organised by the Australian Council for Educational Research (ACER). The 2023 IM2C, held between 13 February and 1 May, tasked students with creating mathematical models and submitting a report of up to twenty pages, along with a summary and a recommendation letter to community leaders and business planners. The challenge theme for this year was *Using Land: A valuable resource*, which focused on optimising land-use planning while balancing community values and business profits.

One of our teams, the Calcoholics (*made up of Year 10 students Matthias Elgawly, Disen Liu, Andrew Pye and Jeff Tse, shown below*), received the Meritorious Achievement Award in the National round and was selected as one of two teams to represent Australia in the international round of judging.

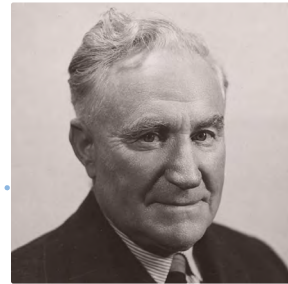
Out of 55 teams from 31 countries participating in the international round of judging, Sydney Boys High School's team received an Honourable Mention for their outstanding performance in the competition.

Bursary Recipient Profile:

Sir Earle Page



Presently 25 boys are supported by a bursary at SBHS. The Right Honourable Sir Earle Page (1895)—Prime Minister of Australia, 1939; Chancellor of the University of New England; one of a small group of Australian Members of the Most Distinguished Order of St Michael and St George, Privy Councillor and Companion of Honour; and one of Sydney High School's most distinguished Old Boys—was one of the School's earliest scholarship recipients.

Born in 1880, Earle Christmas Grafton Page was a student at Grafton Superior Public School who won a scholarship to Sydney High School and came to Sydney (as did many country boys of that era) in 1895 for a final 'finishing year' before going on to Sydney University.

In his posthumous autobiography *Truant Surgeon* (Angus and Robertson, 1963), he reflected on the impact that attending High had on his life:

Sydney High School, established by Sir George Reid's Government in 1883, offered six bursaries a year, which were of three year's tenure and available for competition among New South Wales students under the age of fourteen...

I was bundled down to Sydney High School for a final year's studies. The school was then under the headmastership of Joseph Coates, a former international cricketer, with a high reputation in the teaching profession. Two other talented teachers supervised the sixth form. William Crompton taught us classics and English. He was a product of Winchester and Balliol and a grandson of the inventor of the Crompton spinning mill. Lawrence Stephenson, a senior wrangler of Cambridge, taught mathematics, and, because of the clarity with which he expounded the subject, sent up a procession of University scholarship winners. Under their tuition I learnt at school my first-year Arts honours work while preparing for my honours in matriculation. As a result, despite my youth and my absence from home, I led in general proficiency at the critical examination in first-year Arts and was awarded the Struth Exhibition...

Good fortune brought me not only accomplished teachers but also an incomparable galaxy of good friends throughout my student days. A remarkably large number of my contemporaries were destined to follow distinguished careers in many walks of life.

Our trails frequently crossed in later years. Their loyalty and advice, given freely, never failed to renew the inspiration of early years and assist me in the tasks I had undertaken...

I was destined to see a great deal of these and many other old boys of the High School in the course of my career. Sir John McLaren, who became Secretary of the Prime Minister's Department and Official Secretary at Australia House, London, was closely associated with me during my Ministerial career; Robert Ewing was Commonwealth Taxation Commissioner when I was Treasurer...

The presence of Clarrie Chapman as Under-Secretary of the New South Wales Treasury renewed a happy school association when I was negotiating the financial Agreement between the Commonwealth and States. With Alf Pollack, I worked closely in the fight for Clarence River development. W.H. Myers, fifty years after our school association, gave outstanding assistance in the arrangement of interconnection between the Newcastle and Clarence electricity transmission systems during the war. The sage advice and profound actuarial knowledge of Andy Sneddon and Arthur Eedy were freely available to me when, as Treasurer, I produced the National Insurance Bill of 1928. R.T. Mackay, Vice-Chairman of the Sydney Metropolitan Water and Sewerage Board and one of the earliest advocates of the scheme to use the waters of the Snowy River, inspired and advised me in my campaigns for water conservation.

Thus, in my schooling at Grafton and Sydney, I gained not only a sound grounding in academic education, but also a panel of distinguished friends whose wisdom and companionship have since supported me on many a weary political expedition.

To mark the opening of the School's new premises at Moore Park in 1928, Sir Earle Page donated £200 to provide annual language prizes, thereby giving back to the School, which had given him so much. Originally awarded to the best languages scholar in the School, there are now two prizes in his name: the *Sir Earle Page Prize for German* and the *Sir Earle Page Prize for French* are awarded to a Year 12 student for first place in German and French each year.

Celebrating 140 Years of Cadets at High

The Sydney High School Cadet Unit Marches On!

Sydney High School Cadet Unit (SHSCU) was established in 1883, the same year as the School itself, making it the second oldest Cadet Unit in the country.

When I signed on as MIC of Cadets, having served as an officer in the Australian Army myself, I was unaware of this history and the intricacies of the Cadet Program more generally. Ironically, although I joined the Army after High, I did not participate in Cadets while at the School. My friends at the time derived a deep sense of purpose from the program, then ably facilitated by former teacher John Fittler.

I initially had many questions about how the teaching staff coordinate and lead the program, and was surprised to discover that cadets themselves perform these functions to a large extent. In the weeks that followed, I observed the cadets running a training program for 100 students; preparing for, and executing, bivouacs; rehearsing drill and military etiquette; mentoring recruits; and overseeing the weekly operation of the Unit, much of which occurs outside of school hours. Seeing the Unit function well without significant teaching staff intervention allayed my initial fears and impressed me greatly. The new command team of CUO Johnsun, CUO Zhang, and CDTWO2 Huang navigated difficulties together and achieved excellent results relatively independently.

In the last ten years, the Unit (made up of cadets from both SBHS and SGHS) has grown from 20 to roughly 100 cadets and this has significantly increased the administrative burden. These growing pains were navigated initially with the support of MAJ Ross Dean, Australian Army Cadets (AAC), and CAPT Kay Kelly (AAC) who provided vital oversight until ongoing support from within the High community could be found. Old Boys LT Ronald Luo (AAC) (2017), 2LT Harvey Luo (AAC) (2017), and 2LT Adam Masen (AAC) (2020) have provided this support to the Unit for the last several years. The Cadets Program is run by volunteers and its survival is dependent on their ongoing support. Parents have also made significant contributions to the operation of the Unit, particularly most recently, Binh Johnsun.



General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove (Retd) honoured High and the Unit by accepting an invitation to act as the Reviewing Officer for this year's Passing Out Parade on 29 August 2023. (See photo on page 2.) Following his retirement in 2022, Sir Peter was appointed as the inaugural Patron of Australian Defence Force Cadets. The diligent work put in by all members of our Unit led to an outstanding parade. The precision and discipline displayed on the parade ground that day was a powerful declaration that 140 years on, the Unit continues to uphold the traditions established by previous generations of cadets at High.

Following the parade, Dr Jaggar welcomed our official guests to the School and the Unit's 140th Anniversary Supper in the Great Hall (which had been sumptuously arranged by a dedicated team of parents). Distinguished Old Boy Brigadier Robert Lording (1981) spoke with great fondness of his time as a cadet and how that shaped his life. The Commander of NSW Cadets, Colonel Andrew White, congratulated the Unit on its anniversary and spoke of the ongoing relevance and utility of the skills and attitudes the Cadet Program fosters. Two new ceremonial infantry swords were presented to the Unit by Terry Farley (pictured above), President of our key supporter, Paddington-Woollahra RSL Sub Branch. At the conclusion of formalities, all present shared a delicious meal and celebrated the outgoing Year 12 cadets and the Unit's achievement of this great milestone.

Radio broadcaster **John Stanley (1973)** interviewed **Evan Wong (2010)**, CEO & Co-Founder of Checkbox, and **George Miller AO (1963)**, filmmaker, director, producer and writer, leading to thought-provoking and entertaining discussions. George's movie reel was 'worth the price of admission'. **Sam McCool (1993)** appeared as Dr Tomaso D'Sousa PHD, a hoax keynote speaker with a very funny presentation on AI and the future of education. Sam harpooned selective schools, Elon Musk and both current and future parents generally. He capped his presentation by bringing Spot, the robot dog, on stage (credit to

Spire Group) and by enabling his AI self to close out the hoax (credit to IBM).

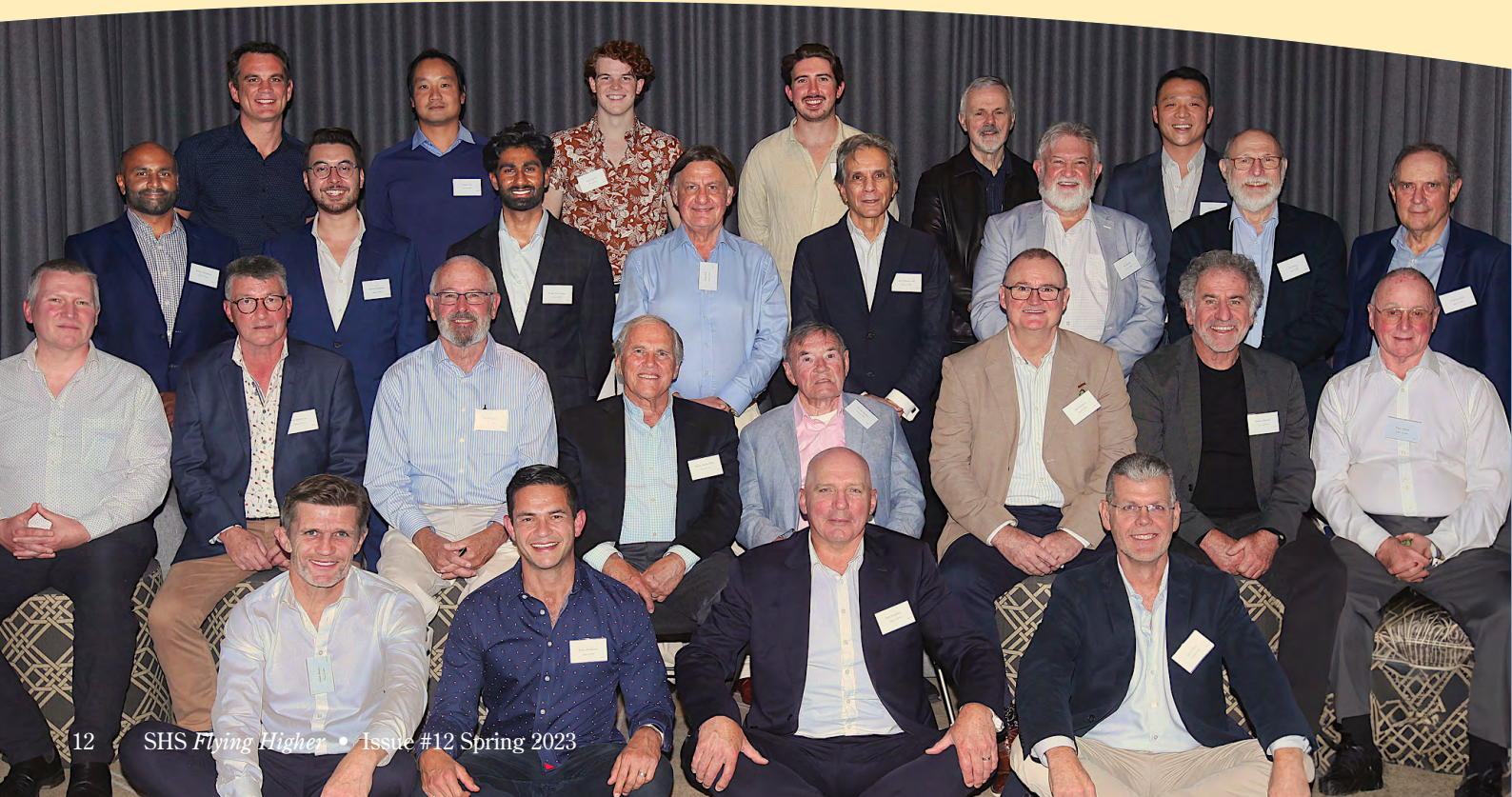

Ahead of the Field

The High GPS Cross Country squad consists of 70 to 100 athletes, across all ages, competing in three age groups: Opens, U16 and U14. Our runners performed consistently well this season, achieving outstanding results for the squad—with respectable 4th place in Opens, 3rd in Under 16 and 4th in Under 14. Max Russell was crowned Open GPS Champion, meaning he was the best-performing athlete across the season, with the most first positions.

This is the first year that the CAS vs GPS Cross Country races were held in the Junior, Intermediate and Opens category. There was a sense of excitement amongst the younger athletes at being able to represent either the CAS or GPS. Max Russell was selected in the Open 8 GPS team and Nestor Chan was selected in the Under 14 team (*both are pictured left*). At the completion of the Open race the point score was 16-23 and the GPS team was declared winner.

Max Russell went on to shine at the National Cross Country Championships. At the Australian U20 Cross Country Championships in Canberra, Max placed 17th overall and 8th within the younger U20 age group. A huge congratulations to Max for his outstanding race results and we look forward to seeing him perform on the international stage in the coming years.

Each work highlighted the vision, creativity and dedication of its student creator and was not only of the highest quality but also unique to each student. Our special guest was Old Boy **Ramesh Mario Nithiyendran (2006)**, a trailblazing artist whose unique approach has garnered global recognition and national visibility. While his work has been exhibited all over the world, he also features regularly in a diverse range of media related to art, culture and fashion. His work is held in numerous public collections including the Art Gallery of New South Wales, the National Gallery of Victoria, the Art Gallery of South Australia and the Art Gallery of Western Australia. He has received numerous awards and accolades. In 2016, he was the

youngest artist in history to have a solo exhibition at the National Gallery of Australia. Last year, a monograph documenting over 500 artworks he made since finishing university was published and internationally distributed by Thames and Hudson. This same year he was named one of GQ's Men of the Year. Ramesh kindly donated an etching for a silent auction, accompanied by his signed monograph.

Ms Gladys Lai, a SGHS alumna who has worked in the field of art and media, was the judge for the Judy Cassab Prize, awarding Sydney Girls' student Nazara Jones the coveted prize for her drawing *Recording in Progress: The Tub*. The Judy Cassab Prize was established in 2018 by her son, Peter Kampfner, in memory of Cassab, a renowned Australian modern artist and the first woman to win the Archibald Prize (twice). The prize is awarded to a student from Sydney Girls or Sydney Boys High School for an outstanding painting or drawing.

The success of the evening and the following two days was due to the tireless work of both students and their teachers. Binh Johnsun and a group of parent volunteers supported the teachers' efforts to raise awareness and attendance at the opening celebration, and provided refreshments for the evening. Focus on PDHPE

Through the study of Personal Development, Health and Physical Education (PDHPE) at SBHS, students develop knowledge, understanding, skills and attitudes needed to take action to protect and enhance their own and others' health, safety and wellbeing in varied and changing contexts. Physical Education is fundamental to the acquisition of movement skills and concepts to enable students to participate in a range of physical activities—confidently, competently and creatively.

We are currently teaching the boys in Stage 4 resistance exercises using resistance bands that were supplied to each student by the School. Each boy in Years 7 and 8 is developing a foundation of resistance exercises to use at home, in PE classes and during his Sport sessions during the week.

The PDHPE Department will change the Year 10 syllabus for next year to include a variety of indoor and outdoor sports—Table Tennis, Badminton, Volleyball, Indoor Hockey, Ultimate Frisbee, Speedball, American Football and Lacrosse. This will expose students to a variety of sporting options in addition to playing and developing skills developed in our GPS sports in Years 7 through 9.



In Years 7 and 8 we will be introducing an Athletics unit of work into our PDHPE curriculum to give our boys more knowledge and expertise in the track and field events at the Athletic Carnivals. This unit of work will include sprint starts, hurdles, throwing the javelin, shot put, discus and high jump technique.

Good Sports

There have been many recent changes here at High for Sport, including the rollout of a number of online enhancements to facilitate interaction with the Sport Department. Last year, Clipboard (the School's new sport management system) was rolled out to all students. Clipboard provides a personalised view of students' extracurricular commitments, including game fixtures, times, locations and session notes. A *Report a Sports Absence* form was put on the Parent Portal and will enable parents to directly log absences for any upcoming training sessions or fixtures. Students now have a 'How to' section on Canvas in the Sports Module that serves as an FAQ section for all things related to Sport. Users can refer to this section for information on writing sports lines, finding permission notes and other general sport information.

The current Year 7s were the first to participate in the 'Year 7 Rotation Program', in which they learnt general skills related to sport training and organisation, whilst also getting to know their fellow peers in Year 7. Additionally, they had the opportunity to try out the wide range of GPS sports

offered at SBHS from the beginning of their time at the School. The current Year 7s also became the second cohort to receive resistance bands. These students now have access to an entire library of movements designed to utilise these bands to increase their resistance, as each GPS sport begins to integrate them into their training programs.

Supporting the ethos of SBHS as a GPS school, all students will now trial for a GPS sport. The School Sport calendar has now been organised into three distinct seasons: Summer, Winter and Athletics. This exposure to seasonal sports, along with the focus on resistance training and access to Strength and Conditioning programs, aims to promote the idea of each student as a well-rounded athlete.

Making History

The History Faculty at Sydney Boys High School aims to provide students with the opportunity to study a wide range of History with the help of experienced teachers.

With the mandatory History syllabus, we start in Year 7 with the Ancient World and a focus on Ancient Greece and Ancient China. Year 8 has a Medieval World focus looking at Medieval Europe, the Vikings, and Japan under the Shogun. In Year 9 the focus is on the Modern World from the Industrial Revolution to now. We then move to Elective History in Year 10 with a more thematic focus on History from Ancient to Modern. For seniors, we offer Ancient History, Modern History, History Extension, Studies of Religion and Philosophy.

We endeavour to offer our students as many interesting experiences as possible. This year, we took Year 10 Elective classes to the Chau Chak Wing Museum at the University of Sydney where they were able to view and handle many ancient artefacts.



Year 10, as part of their study of genocide, were taken to the Sydney Jewish Museum where they spoke with a Holocaust survivor and examined the impacts of genocide. Ancient and Modern History students attended a HTA Study Day at the University of Sydney (pictured, above); Studies of Religion students went to the Nan Tien Temple for a day to learn about Buddhism. More recently, we had World War I Living History in to focus on WWI and allow students to examine and handle many artefacts from that war. We hope that these experiences help students in their study of History.

Families of Sydney High School

The Musgroves: Three Generations at High

There have been many iconic families that have contributed greatly to Sydney High School including names such as Rubie, McKay, McGill, Fetherston and Luxford. However not many High families have had the distinction of the Musgrove family of having three generations of boys attend the School.

Hailing from the eastern beaches of Sydney (Coogee to be precise), the family's connection with High began when **Peter Musgrove (1947)** started at the School in 1943. During his time at the School Peter participated in a wide range of High's offerings and in his final year was Vice Captain, Captain of Boats, represented the School in the First XV and First VIII, and obtained Blues in Rowing and Swimming. Not just a talented sportsman, he also won the Oswald Chapman Prize 'To the best all-rounder in Year 12, selected on the basis of character, scholarship, sport and participation in School activities', the John Waterhouse prize, 'Awarded to the Prefect who has done most in the interests of the School, particularly in the way of keeping the "esprit de corps" and maintaining a high moral tone', and the G.C. Saxby Prize for Mathematics. After leaving school, he maintained an active interest in High through his son and grandsons, and served as President of the P&C from 1975 to 1978. Peter went on to become a successful doctor.

Peter's son **David Musgrove (1977)** was next to join the School in 1972. David was a prefect, played three years of First Grade Basketball and in his final year played First XV Rugby and was awarded a Blue for his selection in the GPS Combined 3rd XV. His younger brother **Tim Musgrove (1978)** followed and was an active participant in many school activities including the Union Committee, the Interact Club, and a range of sports. Following in the footsteps of his father, but going one better, Tim

was named School Captain for 1978. He played three years of First Grade Basketball and two years of First XV Rugby, as well as being awarded the Arch Ferguson prize, 'Awarded to sons, grandsons, brothers of Old Boys in Years 8-12 for academic achievements and services to the School', and the Francis Bush Memorial Prize, 'Awarded to a Year 11 student for popularity, general character and general proficiency in School and sport'. After school Tim followed his father into the medical profession, specialising in arthroscopic and reconstructive surgical procedures of the knee and ankle, and knee joint replacement/arthroplasty.

The third generation of Musgroves to attend High were Tim's sons Jack and Sam. Both boys took advantage of the opportunity to join the School in Year 9, as many other sons, grandsons and brothers of Old Boys have done. **Jack Musgrove (2010)** joined the School in 2007 and was a similarly active contributor, being the Open Swimming Champion in 2009 and 2010, playing in the First XV in those two years, and rowing in the First VIII in his final year. Jack also won the Old Boys Prize, 'Awarded to the student who was not necessarily first in sport, not necessarily first in scholarship, but certainly first in the hearts of his fellows'. His brother **Sam Musgrove (2015)** started at High in 2012. Sam was a prefect in his final year, as well as representing the First XV for three years, the First VIII for two years and being awarded Rowing and Swimming Blues (like his grandfather before him). Sam was also a member of the CHS Combined First XV and the Combined States First XV, a CHS Men's Championship rower, the holder of the current School record for the 2k erg and a winner of the Arch Ferguson prize. Jack now works in the medical profession while Sam is currently pursuing his goal of becoming an elite athlete in Ironman Triathlon.

Leon Goldberg (1944) died in June 2020. A rugby player while at High, he went on to become a renowned Sydney solicitor who practised for over 50 years.

Colin Crossingham (1967) passed away on 24 October 2021.

Robert Davies (1948) passed away on 29 August 2022.

Robert William Collins (1950) passed away on 7 January 2023. Upon leaving High, Robert studied engineering at the University of Technology.

Denis William Howard (1949) passed away on 14 January 2023. Denis is remembered for his great intellect and compassion and as a world class bridge player.

Justin Higgins (1990) passed away on 25 February 2023 after a short battle with cancer. Justin rowed in the 1989 2nd VIII, played Rugby and was a (Ssgt) GUO in Cadets. His brother, Nick Higgins (1991) described him as 'humble, loyal, joyous, bloody cheeky and an all-round good bloke'.

Malcolm Sconce (1963) (pictured below with the GPS Premiership-winning 1963 First XV) passed away in April 2023, following a period in palliative care, during which he was visited by his long-time school friends John Brass (1963) and Van Cooney (1964). He represented the School in Cricket and in the 1963 GPS Premiership-winning Rugby First XV. He continued his sporting interests after school and played with many former schoolmates at the Randwick club.



Maurice Stanley Hudson (1946) passed away on 14 August 2023. After leaving school to study medicine, he landed in a job at Garden Island where by chance he met his future wife Beverley. Maurice eventually turned to law and ran a successful legal practice for the remainder of his working life.

Robert 'David' Curtis (1968) passed away suddenly in August 2023. David was an airline engineer for many years, travelling around the world in the role before settling in the Hills district.

Stuart Kelly (1976) passed away on 18 August 2023 after a long battle with cancer. A Senior Prefect, Stuart embraced all that the School had to offer. In his final (5th) rowing season, he was elected Captain of Boats, and was selected as Stroke of the First VIII (pictured below). Stuart was a librarian, a cadet and President of the Interact Club; he also played Rugby for the School, and represented High across a range of track and field events in Athletics, having been the Year 11 U16 School age champion. He received Sporting Blues for Rowing and Athletics and was awarded the John Skyring Cross Memorial Trophy for 1976.



Stephen McMorro (1979) passed away on 26 August 2023. During his time at High, Stephen rowed in the First VIII in 1978 and was Captain of Boats and Stroke of the First VIII in 1979. A dedicated, caring and loving father and husband, he fought an extended battle with cancer.
