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From the PRINCIPAL

We began the year with much improved staff wellbeing, higher morale and a stronger sense of collective purpose. The resolution of the salaries campaign meant increases flowed through into teacher salaries and the temporary to permanent placement initiative allowed multiple teachers to improve their positions. Teachers are now busy implementing, writing or preparing programs to meet the learning needs of the new syllabuses.

Technology

Last year we worked hard to stay independent and not migrate to DoE Et4L, so we could continue to run Clipboard and other applications it could not support. Thanks to fantastic design work by James Rudd and David Isaacs, the negotiating skill of John Prorellis and the support of our Director, Angela Lyris, we met the DoE's stringent security demands. The efforts of Jamie Kay, George Barris and David Isaacs, enabled us to transition to Sentral for our reconfigured Student Awards Scheme.

Planning and implementing

The expectations driving the *Strategic Improvement Plan* remain the same—we just added the same strategies to Year 9 programming as this year's goal. The Year 7 and 8 programs were audited for compliance with the basic skills requirements. We are still firmly focused on what we know will improve HSC results in writing-based assessments—de-coding sentences; writing clearer, more coherent and more complex sentences; constructing better paragraphs; and composing more nuanced and sophisticated responses to questions. We also added five sentence building exercises to our Stage 4 programs.

Literacy initiatives

We completed the roll-out of the 'sentence conscious pedagogy' strategies from *The Writing Revolution* and maintained the literacy workshops initiative for identified students in Years 7 and 9. We gave access to ATOMI course-specific materials and assessments to identified year 12 students who completed 598 hours of online learning and answered more than 35,000 questions, and are planning to roll out ATOMI access to selected students in Years 7–12. In addition, we provided every student free access to 'Study Samurai' and invested in supporting various literacy experiments. My thanks go to the P & C for donating \$100k to help with a range of these initiatives—this turned our P & L from a loss to a tiny profit, much to our relief.

Collective efficacy

Following on from last year's 'shared understanding of effective classroom practice', we are focusing on the 'deep learning matrix'. Teachers need to ask themselves about the importance of the outcomes being pursued and why they are important for students. We need to be sure of the alignment between intended outcomes and the success criteria for the unit/topic or lesson. We need to use strategies for gauging understanding and follow up with activities and feedback for students who have not grasped the big ideas. The objective is to ascertain our impact on learning.

Properties update

The COLA roof was extended and other maintenance work completed ahead of sending the site out to tender. Thanks to **Graeme Anderson** (1979), we secured an advantageous Community Use Agreement with Eastern Suburbs Cricket Club. We are working on a longer-term agreement to be managed by the SHS Foundation. While the toilet refurbishment was completed last year, the Cooler Classrooms project has only completed the Killip Wing and delayed plans to aircondition the Junior Library. Spectator seating alongside the tennis courts was installed.

Six student groups from Year 10 Design & Technology produced designs for a clubroom for the tennis courts complex, to complement the Pro Shop and join it with a storage bay, and the plans for the winning design were sent to the DoE for approval. Construction of the facility was completed thanks to a bequest from Old Boy **Barry William Finigan (1937)** (see pp. 8 & 15). It has been a privilege to have been able to support assessment projects that bring to life the creativity of existing students, and realise these with the support of an Old Boy, for the use of current and future students.

Academic & Co-curricular Highlights

At the Sydney Philosothon, Andrew Pye came first in Year 10 and our Year 10 team came first in Teams.

High performed well at the National Chinese Eisteddfod, with two teams coming first in the group performance category and three students coming second in the individual performance category.

Joshua Li and Eric Scholten were invited to participate in the Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee Contest where Eric won a Bronze Award. Aaron Huang, Michael Zhuo, Joshua Li and Tanish Sarathy were invited to participate in the Australian Maths Trust's 2023 High Performance Mathematics School of Excellence and Aaron was offered a place in the Junior Division of the AMT's Selection School.

Joseph Britton was selected to the Public Schools State Drama Ensemble.

Ahasan Kabir and Kaden Kuang's Design and Technology major works were nominated for SHAPE and Kaden's work was selected for exhibition.

Akira Ha, Timothy Jian, Yianni Scarlis, Joshua Tang and Moshe Tao's music performances and Benjamin Pirom and Yianni Scarlis' compositions were nominated for ENCORE 2023.

Aiden McManus, Brannavan Prabaharan and Dimitri Tsovolos claimed second place in NSW for their business idea of glass solar panels in the EBE Plan Your Own Business Enterprise Competition.

The SHS Cadet Unit won third place in the CSIRO's CyberTaipan 2023, an Australian youth cyber defence competition in which teams of students analyse virtual images to find and fix vulnerabilities, strengthen systems, and maintain critical services.

Our Year 9 Ethics Olympiad team of Jude Ou, Tristan Cheung, Balhar Athwal, and Mohammad Rachid earned a silver medal and were invited to compete in the International Final.

Ioannis Chatzinikolaou's short film *The Earth Dies Screaming* won the People's Choice Award at the V-Fest 2023 and was a finalist at the Flickerup Shorts National Youth film competition. Justin Huynh won first prize at the Youth Photographic Award & Short Film Prize 2023 and Dimitri Tsovolos, Kalan Cusick, Brannavan Prabaharan and James Cao's short film *Beyond* was Highly Commended.

Liam Nottage was selected into the CHS Junior State Debating Team.

Leon Lu's team won second place in the VEXIQ 2023 National Championship robotics competition.

Drama student Nathan Nguyen was selected to be a 2024 Griffin Theatre Ambassador.

Sporting Highlights

High had strong results at the GPS Athletics carnival, placing 3rd in the Junior, 5th in the Intermediate and 7th in the Senior Point Scores (see page 7).

Henry Lau recorded the second highest individual point scoring total in High Basketball history (44 points vs Kings) and Ary Balhero the eighth highest (38 points vs Grammar).

Kevin Bui played in the U14s and Nelson Lee in the U17s at the Australian Youth Volleyball Championships. At the National Schools Competition our Year 10 team took out silver and our Year 8 team bronze in the honours division. Ethan Yu was selected to play in the Australian Youth beach Volleyball Championships and Karan Dahiya, Jerald Yu, Steven Yin and Andy Zhang made the Sydney East Region Volleyball team to compete at the CHS Inter-regional Carnival.

Our Water Polo team finished runner-up in the Dave Woods Shield Sydney East final.

Jacob Yin (Rowing), Jack Wang (Rowing), Ren-Shyan Balnave (Cross Country), and Dimitrios Logothetis (Volleyball) earned Sydney East Blues.

Oscar Shi represented Australia at the Junior Asian Fencing championships in Bahrain.

School records were broken at this year's Swimming Carnival by Jiazi Chen, Brian Ahn, David Kim, Brian Cho, Brendan Tan, John Hong and Jinu Shin. Oliver Yin qualified for the Australian Age Swimming Championships.

At the CHS Rowing Regatta in Grafton, Jacob Yin was Best Male Rower and Roman Samsonov Junior Champion.



Farewell to Mr Gainford

Anthony Mark Gainford has officially retired as a teacher at High after 48 years of service, having started teaching at the school in 1975. He retired as the longest serving staff member in the school's 140-year history.

After attending North Sydney Boys High School, and going on to gain degrees in chemical engineering, science and teaching, Mr Gainford had an interest in pursuing his teaching career in a similar academically-selective high school. Although he was not a rower, a friend recommended that he try coaching at High, and this became an enduring passion during his time at the school.

Our own version of Mr Chips, Mr Gainford has been the soul of High Spirit and much loved by cohorts of boys. Teaching Mathematics at all levels, he was a great recruiter for Rowing and Rugby, both of which he served continuously since his appointment to the school. He was also involved for a time in Rifle Shooting and Cross-Country. He served as CO of Cadets, long-term editor of *The Record*, Prefects MIC, Chair of the Badges Committee, and was a long-serving executive

member of the AAGPS Committee. His contribution has been extensive, long-lasting, and valuable.

Mr Gainford could fill volumes with his memories of the boys—their gifts, talents and struggles—as no doubt the boys could with his anecdotes and stories. In particular, he remembers the maths genius of many boys, including one who went on to study at Trinity College, Cambridge. Other highlights include watching the First IV win the Yaralla Cup in 1976, and the First XV beating Joeys in 1979, 1988 and the famous last win of 1993. He is proud of the fact that his junior teams beat every other GPS school at least once, of his twenty productive years of Cadets, and the great achievements of the prefects. Mark says his love for sport and the GPS is one of the main reasons he stayed at High for so long.

When asked what he'll miss, the main thing is the banter in the Maths staffroom and in his classrooms. As to what has changed from when he joined the staff at High in 1975, it would be the demographics of the school, from the larger numbers of Greek and Jewish students in his early years, as well as the shift in sporting participation.

Sports like Basketball and Volleyball have grown in popularity while interest in some of the 'traditional' sports has shifted over time. When he was the Rugby Master many years ago, the school had twenty-one Rugby teams and only two Football teams!

There have been many fantastic and longserving teachers that have defined the school experience of a large number of High boys, but few could claim to have made such an indelible mark on the fabric of Sydney High School as Mr Gainford. As his time at the school comes to an end, he will be fondly remembered by decades of High Old Boys.

BOWLED OVER

Cricket is a sport with a history at High dating back to 1906. We have had great success in the GPS competition, winning the First XI premiership in 1933, 1934, 1938, 1968, 1979, 1982 and 1994. Our Second XI won the premiership in 1981 and in 1980 we won the Alan Davidson Shield. More recently, Sydney High represented NSW in the National Championships after making it through into the finals of the CHS Competition. Our cricketers have also made representative honours over the last four years—Hunar Verma (U19 Australian team and current Blues squad), Albert Giles (GPS XI 2021), Xavier Nath (GPS XI 2022 & NSW U17), and Atharv Ramakanth (GPS XI 2023 and NSW U16).

SBHS cricketers play in the GPS Competition, Davidson Shield and annual exchanges with other schools. We currently have 13 teams in the GPS Competition and the coaches aim to improve individual performance as well as teamwork. Each Cricket team participates in three training sessions per week and plays many matches throughout the season. After the GPS season ends, we feature our annual exchange visits. Our First XI participates in the Annual 5 Highs National Carnival over five days, where State

As the Cricket Program evolves, we anticipate increased participation and a rise in the overall skill level of our teams. We have paired up with the Easts Cricket Club, who run special programs and camps to develop our young boys. High is not only creating a nurturing environment for cricket enthusiasts, but is also actively working towards establishing a strong presence in regional and inter-school competitions.

High Tech

The new Software Engineering HSC course provides opportunities for students to engage more deeply with modern topics like computer science and software engineering through the lens of practical tasks and projects. The focal areas of mechatronics, object-oriented design, machine learning, secure software architecture and programming for the web allow students to develop the technical, creative, teamwork and computational thinking skills which are crucial to success in this field. The Year 10 course will also be replaced with a revamped curriculum which explores contemporary software development practices, and design and systems thinking along with data analysis and programming skills.

The Makerspace has become a hub for collaborative design, architecture, modelling, software design and mechatronics activities. A team of enthusiastic Year 10 Graphics Technology students have provided their services to the school community to design, model and 3D-print bespoke solutions to problems. Hamzah Ahmed has made solid progress with his stair-climbing robot

prototype in addition to a web-based school timetable app which is widely used by other students.

The CHS season was summed up with the delivery of the 2023 Kippax Cup for Highest Points for a Boy's School at the CHS Championship. Medallists included Max Russell: 1st Opens 3k, 1st Opens 1500m, 3rd Opens 800m; Liwen Deng, Mark Yan, Roger He & Alex Ruhfus: 2nd 14's 4x100m Relay; Naeer Nibras, Khai Pham, Garry Liu & Dylan Dutt: 2nd 16's 4x100m Relay; Alex Ruhfus: 1st 14's 100m; Owen Trinh: 3rd 13's 100m; and Lachlan Leung: 2nd 15's Long Jump.

At the 2024 NSW Championships, five current students and two Old Boys took to the track with the goals of placing on podiums and qualifying for the National Championships. Special mention to Alex Ruhfus who placed 1st in the U16 100m with a time of 11.12—the fastest all conditions result of any High boy ever in his age group.

I would like to thank Dr Kim Jaggar for his ongoing support, Ms Hannah Jackson, the relieving Head Teacher of Sport, my support staff including Ms Natalie Luu and Mr Casey Writer, and all the amazing Athletics coaches. Of course the success of the 2023 season would not have been possible without the amazing efforts of the athletes themselves. A special thanks to our largest group of Year 12 athletes, led by Athletics Captain Kaden Kuang (four GPS sports in Year 12), as their commitment to training during their trials really set the tone for the other cohorts.

Advantage High

Tennis is one of the most popular sports at Sydney Boys High, with over 150 students playing in the 2023-24 season. The Tennis Program is committed to providing a quality program for as many interested students as possible. Teams from the Development Squad to First Grade receive quality coaching, attention, and resources. All players train three times per week, with two court and one speed and agility session. (First and Second Grade players have an additional court session.) Tennis athletes are also encouraged to attend the weights room and resistance bands and strength work were introduced this season to help build on the standard of fitness.

The focus on training and development in the Tennis Program has led to above-average performance. Our players win over half of all their matches against other GPS schools. In 2020 our Second Grade team won the Premiership and we won both First and Second Grade in 2016.

Moving forward, a main goal for the Tennis Program will be boosting the competitiveness of our First and Second Grade teams. By building the physical competency of our Tennis athletes and enhancing development pathways and opportunities for all our players, we aim to have the best quality Tennis players represent the school. We aim to teach our Tennis athletes across the board to take on greater autonomy



of their health, fitness, and skill. This year saw a large drop in performance at the start of Term 1 compared to the end of Term 4, as a significant number of students reported doing little to no exercise over the summer holidays.

The program and school courts have received a major boost with the construction of a Tennis clubhouse (pictured above) thanks to a generous bequest from an Old Boy (see page 15 for more). This will serve many purposes including hosting First and Second Grade events. We are also grateful for the increased parent involvement in fundraising through parking as this is a vital component of enabling the school to keep the program running.

The Duke of Edinburgh's International Award is a positive and rewarding challenge of self-discovery that is offered to students of Sydney Boys High School from Year 9. Celebrating 100 Years of GPS Rowing at High

On Saturday, 9 December 2023, close to 200 people gathered on an extremely hot day at the Outterside Centre to celebrate High Rowing and 100 years since our first GPS Head of the River. Over 120 Old Boys from 1948 to 2023 came 'Back to the Sheds', with nine crews coming back to row against the current First VIII.

There was a wonderful atmosphere in the Outterside Centre as Old Boys reignited memories of their time at High and shared stories with our current rowers. From the speeches by members of the High Rowing community, we learned about the record number of rowers in the program and the support staff like Mark Gainford have given to the program over the years.

Principal Dr Kim Jaggar OAM's support of the Rowing Program was recognised on the day by the opening of the Dr Kim Jaggar OAM Weights Room.

Dr Jaggar came to High at a time when funds were low and the rowing centre was unfinished. As a result of his stewardship, the Outterside Centre is now well-maintained and a support system has been built up around sport at the school.

The contribution of the Barris family to High Rowing was also recognised—for one third of the 100 years of High GPS Rowing, a Barris has been in charge! Con Barris managed to run an entire rowing program on no budget and without paying a single coach. He coached, ran the weights room at the school and kept everything going at the Rowing Sheds—all while serving as Head Teacher of History. His son George is now carrying on his legacy as MIC of Rowing.

The day was headlined by the First VIII vs Old Boys race. With a historically-large number of Old Boys in attendance, nine crews braved the



hot, sub-optimal conditions to compete over two races. The conditions only added to the fun, as a wash ran through the first race, spraying relieving, cold water onto the rowers, and causing one of our Old Boys to go for a swim in the Paramatta River.

Special Old Boy guests included: David Anderson (1948), Olympic bronze medalist and member of the 1948 Head of the River (HOR)-winning crew; Ric Donaldson, Jim Woodcock and Warren Leroy from the 1953 HOR -winning crew; Reg Smith from 1957 HOR-winning crew; Ian Stewart from the 1959 HOR-winning crew; Mark Prater (2000), the current coach of the Australian Men's Olympic VIII; former World Champion Dom Grimm (2005); and all of the members of the 1976 Yaralla Cup-winning crew—Mark Vangelatos, Cameron McMorrow, Daniel Vieira, David Dickison & Andrew Bowey.

It was fantastic to see so many Old Boys reunite at the Sheds to celebrate this milestone in High's Rowing history. They serve as a constant reminder of our past and their lasting love for the Sheds and High Rowing is an inspiration.

High Rowing is where it is today thanks to both the Sydney High School Foundation and the Rowing Committee. The Foundation maintains the Outterside Centre and has funded many improvements over time; the Rowing Committee provides essential support for our rowers, spending hours cooking, cleaning and driving the boys. We are grateful for their support and thank the Rowing Committee (led by President Binh Johnsun) for organising such an amazing event, the SHSOBU, and all those who came for making the day so special.

The SHSOBU is excited for another big year in 2024, after arguably our strongest ever year in 2023.

High reunions are the most successful they've been in decades, with almost

20 reunions happening last year, and a similar number planned for this year. We also work closely with the school on 'multi-year' events, such as the recent 100 Years of GPS Rowing at High event, where we had many Old Boys in attendance from the Class of 1948 up to the Class of 2023. Additionally, our database numbers continue to grow positively, meaning we're able to keep more Old Boys updated on our alumni news and events, and help to keep them connected to the school and to each other.

Most importantly, the OBU continues to build on its strong relationship with the school, the Principal and the various bodies that make up the High community. This is no doubt helped by the fact that we have more than ten Old Boys currently working at the school, plus many more contributing their time to help extracurricular activities. We also welcomed over 200 Year 12 students from the Class of 2023 into the Old Boys fold at the end of last year. We encourage those who aren't Life Members of the OBU, to become one, for all the benefits available to them as members, as well as to support the OBU and keep allowing us to continue our important work for High Alumni.

We are actively looking to continue to expand our reach outside of Sydney, as so many Old Boys live and work around Australia and the globe. We are working to connect the Old Boy diaspora and have held international events in London, New York, Singapore and San Francisco. If any groups of Old Boys in other cities are interested in holding similar events, please don't hesitate to contact us.

On the topic of enrolment, the OBU continues to encourage Old Boys to consider High for their sons', grandsons' or nephews' education. In addition to the traditional Year 7 entry, there is also an intake at Year 9 where family connections to High are taken into consideration. Applications for 2025 entry in Years 8 to 11 open in June this year and close in July (see page 20 for details); applications for Year 7 entry in 2026 open in

October this year and close in November. (Please note how early the application process begins for Year 7 entry.)

In Old Boy news, **Nikhil Autar (2011)** (below) was named NSW Young Australian of the Year for his fantastic work in disability advocacy. Nikhil is a cancer survivor, doctor and entrepreneur—but most importantly, he is an inspiration to Old Boys and current students.



We were pleased to have one of our oldest living Old Boys, **Professor Geoffrey Kellerman AO (1942)**, as guest of honour at the Speech Night at the beginning of this year. Professor Kellerman, the Dux of the Class of 1942, gave a tremendous speech covering his time at High and his career in medicine and academia since he left school. On a more sombre note, **John Pilger (1957)**, internationally-renowned journalist, documentary maker, and 1957 Head of the River winner, passed away in London late last year. John was a keen supporter of the school and its endeavours despite having lived in London for decades.

Finally, iconic Sydney High School teacher, Mr Anthony Mark Gainford, has retired as the longest serving teacher in the 140-year history of High, after 48 years of teaching. The OBU would like to thank Mark for his decades of service to the school and the important place he holds in the memories of many Old Boys.

Leaving a Legacy

When asked about the impact that bequests have had on the school, Dr Jaggar mentioned three major Old Boy bequests that have been transformative during his time as Principal of High:

- The Raymond Casey (1954) (pictured below, left) bequest paid for the construction of the Covered Outdoor Learning Area (COLA), which has evolved as an important facility for our Cricket and Fencing programs, as well as a means of having professional coaching gratis for our students from first class cricket players.
- The John Henry Fraser (1933) (pictured below, right) bequest was a turning point for High as it enabled our fundraising to reach a total from which a beginning could be made on the construction of the joint project with SGHS—the Governors Centre, our world-class performing arts centre and dynamic learning space which was completed in 2021.
- The Barry William Finigan (1937) bequest, which
 we received just last year, enabled the school to
 construct a student-designed tennis clubroom
 and connection store beside the existing pro
 shop at the school's tennis courts (see page 8),
 enhancing facilities for our Tennis Program.

These three bequests will have a lasting impact as they have greatly enhanced the facilities and services on offer to the current and future generations of Sydney Boys High students.

Depending on your values and passions, you may specify where you would like your bequest directed. (For example, those wishing to support boys experiencing financial difficulties may choose to support the Bursary Program.) Alternatively, you may wish to consider an unspecified gift where funds will be allocated for use where most needed at the time. Bequests that support general priorities are greatly valued as they allow the school to respond with the greatest speed to changing needs and emerging opportunities.

There are different ways to leave a bequest in your Will to the Sydney High School Foundation, including:

It seems the COVID-19 pandemic is well behind us. Last year was another normal full year of school, with the P&C back in the full swing of supporting the school through various events, parking and the Canteen.

Last year's Open Day had a big turnout despite adverse weather conditions, with over 463 families registered for the event and over 1000 attendees. The P&C provided morning tea, serving up an assortment of hot and cold food and beverages, generously donated by the parent body. Dr Jaggar acknowledged the support of parent volunteers and emphasised the strong sense of community at the school that plays an essential role in its success.

The P&C also supported the Orientation Day and Year 12 Farewell events last year. There is always an abundance of food at these events to ensure our staff, parents and students are well-fed and can relax and enjoy the occasion. The SBHS P&C Welcome Evening for new parents was held at the Governors Centre in February, with fantastic catering from the Sailing parents and students. We look forward to running these events again this year and encourage parents to volunteer and be involved.

Our Canteen Volunteer Coordinator, Grace Guan, introduced the Sign-up Genius last year. This new system made it easier for parents to choose and amend their volunteering times, resulting in an enhanced recruitment and volunteering experience. Our two Canteen staff members are always looking for ways to improve the menu. They introduce new items, and with the assistance of our parent volunteers, prepare and serve a variety of dishes, drawing in more customers—our hungry boys! Our volunteers are the backbone of the Canteen. They are quiet achievers who work tirelessly every day to serve the school community.

The success of the Canteen has enabled the P&C to donate funds to the school to support the students in their learning and wellbeing. These include contributions towards bus replacements to transport students to school activities, textbooks, language offerings, Sentence Conscious Pedagogy professional development for teachers, the COLA roof extension, LED sign replacement, the Wayfinding

project, and a one-off donation for an unexpected increase in staffing costs.

Car parking events raise funds for the sports and co-curriculars at High. Sport and cultural events held at nearby venues have increased over the last twelve months, providing more opportunities for the subcommittees to raise funds. One example was 10 February this year, when the SBHS Football subcommittee parked over 350 cars and raised over \$9,000 from the P!NK concert! Thank you to all the parents and students who have volunteered their time at our car parking events.

To keep parents informed of school activities and processes, the P&C continues to improve on the way we communicate, including creating a WhatsApp group for the subcommittees and each year group (phasing out the WeChat groups used by older years), sending emails regarding General Meetings and the AGM, and posting announcements on SZapp in their areas of interest.

Earlier this year, the P&C funded the installation of a new LED school sign on Cleveland Street. With the new fencing around the school, the old sign was no longer visible. This new sign is clearly visible from the street, which enhances the overall image of the school. The sign will be used for car parking events, to improve signage, and to communicate announcements and messages to visitors and the wider community.

P&C meetings are held every second Monday of the month. Online meetings via Zoom continue to be the preferred mode for parents, and attendance can reach as high as 200 when popular topics are presented, such as HSC Results by Dr Jaggar and How to study for English by the English Head Teacher. Our aim is to have a topic of interest at each General Meeting to inform parents on how they can support their sons in their learning.

The P&C is always in need of assistance, either at the Canteen, school functions, car parking events, or in subcommittees. Please look out for our call for volunteers in the various communication channels!

Families of Sydney High School The McKays: Three Generations at High

The McKay family's connection with High commenced in 1930 when twin boys Laurie and Jack McKay entered the newly-constructed campus at the old Sydney Zoo at Moore Park. The identical twins had memorable times at school and, according to Laurie, were often in trouble but stuck together as twins usually do. On at least one occasion, one of them was given a detention but had other commitments and the other agreed to substitute for him. They were both competent tennis players and represented the school in what was then a very popular sport. Laurie McKay (1934) was Captain of Second Grade premiers in 1934 but his schooldays were cut short when he left school that year to take up a full-time trainee accountant position. Due to ongoing health issues, Jack McKay (1935) spent considerable time absent from school, but still managed to play in the successful 1935 First Grade Tennis team and attain the Leaving Certificate. Laurie worked as a public accountant and tax agent until his passing in 2007. Jack worked at the ANZ Bank but faced ongoing health issues and passed way too soon in 1958, aged 39. Both brothers spent time in the army in the 1940s.

The second generation commenced with Jack's son John McKay (1960). John's time was emotional, with his father's ongoing poor health and subsequent passing when he was in Year 9. He has fond memories of the choir and working with the girls of SGHS in musicals and still has a number of good friendships which were formed at school. John spent a season rowing in the 6th IV and represented the school in Rifle Shooting. He went on to study medicine at Sydney University and specialise in nuclear medicine. He currently lives in Melbourne and in 2023 was awarded an AM for his services to the study of diagnostic PET scanning. Laurie's son Bob McKay (1964) came from out-of-area Berala Public School, thanks to the then-Education Department rules which allowed academically-qualified sons of Old Boys to attend. He enjoyed participating in school life, even though it involved daily travel by train, tram and bus. Bob was School Captain in 1963 and represented the school in Cricket, Rugby, Swimming and Athletics. He won the SGHS Cup for games and sportsmanship in 1964 and was the senior CUO in Cadets and the first recipient of the DJ Duffy Sword of Honour. On leaving school, Bob played with the SHOBs rugby team whilst he pursued a degree in Civil Engineering at Sydney Uni. He subsequently worked for the NSW Government in highway construction and

maintenance and played a significant role in the Hume Highway, F3 Freeway and Pacific Highway construction projects. Bob now lives in the Newcastle region.

The third generation commenced in 1985 when Bob's eldest son Joshua McKay (1990) led the way for his two brothers. He represented the school in Swimming, Cricket and Rugby, and later dropped Cricket for Rowing, a love that he passed on to his children. Josh rowed in the First VIII for two years, was Captain of Boats and Senior Prefect. He went on to study Economics at Sydney Uni, and pursue a successful career in commerce and marketing, working overseas since 2007. Matthew McKay (1992) followed Josh into sport, representing the school in Cricket, Swimming and Rugby, also switching from Cricket to Rowing. Matthew rowed in the First VIII for two years and was the champion sculler, stroke of the VIII and Captain of Boats. He also played Rugby in the First XV for two years, culminating in being selected as hooker for the Representative GPS First XV and NSW schools in 1993. He and brother Ben played together in the front row of the 1993 First XV which had the honour of beating Joeys at McKay. Matthew earned a Sports Science degree from Sydney Uni and currently works as an ambulance paramedic in the Lake Macquarie area. Ben McKay (1993) represented the school in Tennis and Swimming and also rowed for a couple of years. His real passion was Rugby, and he was fortunate to have a cohort which included several good players. Ben played two years in the First XV as hooker and was selected to the GPS First XV and Australian Schools First XV, playing a Test against the touring Welsh Schools in Brisbane. After leaving school, Ben played in the Australian Under 19 Rugby team which played and beat the All Blacks U19s in 1995. That same year, he captained Randwick Colts Rugby, in a team coached by Old Boy Alan Gaffney (1964) which won the Sydney competition. Ben pursued a career in logistics management and currently lives in Sydney.

Footnote: When Bob was School Captain, the teacher/editor of *The Record* rang Bob's dad for a story about his late father and the history of McKay Oval. Laurie took great delight in advising with a chuckle that his dad was still alive and had nothing to do with the establishment of McKay Oval. The three generations of McKays in this story loved playing there, but are not related to the McKays of McKay Oval fame.

John Pilger (1957)

John Pilger (1957) passed away in London on 30 December 2023. John was a world-leading foreign correspondent, journalist, author and documentarian. His reporting and analysis,

including of the wars in Vietnam and Cambodia, while at times controversial, won him international recognition and a number of journalism and film awards. He was described by *The New York Times* in their obituary as a 'voice for the voiceless, Mr Pilger was comfortable in his roles as a journalistic provocateur', and in *The Guardian* as 'a journalist who never shirked from saying the unsayable...the impact of Pilger's journalism was enormous'. John was still an active participant in global affairs at the time of his passing.

He was also a very proud Sydney High School Old Boy, attending High along with his brother Graham (1950). Despite living in London for decades, he maintained a keen interest in the school and in the last few years he attended our London Old

Boys reunion, as well as the reunions of his 1957 Head of the River Winning First VIII crew (pictured below). Rowing was a particular passion of John's during his time at the school and, in addition to being a member of one of our last remaining Head of the River-winning crews, he also held the rare distinction of rowing in the First VIII for three years during his time at High. Kerry Rubie MBE (1958) had this to say on John's passing: 'The depth and strength of feeling that I and his other fellow crew mates had for him is perhaps best captured by the fact that although many years have now passed since we rowed together, we always found time to come back together to celebrate the extraordinary bond that we all had for each other. It was at the heart of winning the Major Rennie Trophy. We rowed as one in 1957 and, even after almost 70 years, did not ever lose that wonderful sense of "oneness"'.

John was a powerful example of a High boy who grew up with very little, in what was then the working-class suburb of Bondi, became internationally-recognised for his achievements across many fields, yet still maintained a certain humility and kindness. Vale.



George Richards (1950)

George Richards (1950) passed away on 16
January 2024. Although the deputy principal of
High said he should go to university, George went
into journalism instead, later finishing an arts degree
part-time at Sydney University. In 1958 he joined
The Sydney Morning Herald, and had an illustrious
career there and at other Fairfax publications
over 45 years. During this time he was posted to
London and travelled overseas to learn about the
computerisation of newspapers. For fifteen of those
years he served as editor of Column 8.

1955 School Captain **Bill Summers (1955)** passed away in September 2020.

Professor David J.A. Clines (1955) passed away on 8 December 2022.

John Bennett OAM (1954) passed away in May 2023. After leaving High, John studied Engineering at Sydney Uni and went on to work on many dam and tunnel projects both in Australia and the United States before setting up his own consulting business. John was a member of Kogarah Rotary and through this worked with Orthopaedic Outreach. He oversaw its financial management for nearly 25 years, resulting in approval for funding for over 500 international team activities throughout the Asia-Pacific, work for which he was posthumously awarded an OAM.

Ross Allan Smith (1951) passed away on 3 June 2023.

Kenneth James Paul OAM (1949) (below, with the 1949 First VIII) passed away on 5 June 2023. He studied architecture at the University of NSW and an early role involved drafting the plans for the Fisher Library at Sydney Uni. He eventually built a reputation in the health and education fields and went on to redevelop a number of hospitals. In 2019 Ken was awarded an OAM for service to architecture and to the community. High and Rowing remained dear to his heart, and when he moved into aged care, he wanted his rowing photos on the wall.



Ronald Hutchison (1951) passed away on 13 October 2023, two days after his 89th birthday.

John Cantwell (1956) (below, with the 1956 School Prefects) passed away on 19 October 2023, aged



84 years. A Prefect, who rowed in the First VIII and played Rugby in the Second XV, John was an accomplished scientist and educator who made significant contributions to public health in the fields of food hygiene, fluoridation, blood alcohol and forensic science.

Dr Peter Duke (1951) a gifted and caring ophthalmologist, passed away on 21 October 2023

Alan Skinner (1959) passed away on 21 October 2023. Alan was in the last High VIII to win the HOR in 1959 (*pictured below*) and went on to play Rugby for Australia.



Anthony Reid (1977) passed away on 26 November 2023 after struggling with diabetes for many years. While at school, Senior Prefect 'Reido' was in the First VIII and Second XV (pictured below).



John Brand (1968) passed away on 3 January 2024 after battling a brain tumour called Glioblastoma Maxiforme for ten months. Remembered by his classmates as an exceptional human being with great humility and character, highly respected by all with whom he came in contact, John leaves a significant legacy, one example of which is the gymnasium at Warilla High School (his last teaching posting), named in his honour.

Felix Fries (1959) passed away on 11 Feb 2024. He had good memories of his school days.



lan Heads OAM (1960) passed away on 25 March 2024. Vice Captain of the 1960 Second XV (shown left) while at High, Heads went on to become a respected sports journalist whose career spanned more than 60 years. He was inducted into the NRL Hall of Fame in 2023. A sports historian, he was also the author of many sports biographies and histories, 35 of which were donated to the school library and make up the lan Heads Collection.
